For over 25 years, Washington Area Women's Foundation has been dedicated to investing in the power and potential of women and girls. Since our founding in 1998, we've proudly partnered with more than 215 local organizations, granting over \$17 million to support women, girls, and gender-expansive people in the Washington metropolitan area.



Did you know less than 2% of philanthropic giving goes to women and girls?

To counter this disparity, the Women's Foundation intentionally prioritizes women, girls, and gender-expansive people of color-led organizations. We provide these organizations with general operating support and a streamlined application process, removing unnecessary barriers. We trust our grantee partners' expertise and actively seek their guidance to ensure our investments align with the most pressing needs identified by those directly impacted.

OUR MODEL

We believe that women and girls of color are powerful agents of change. Despite often being unrecognized, their efforts have consistently advanced human rights and gender, racial, and economic justice in our communities for decades.



Our theory of change is that by increasing resources to, and recognizing the leadership of, women and girls of color, they will ignite needed change.

We put our theory into action through two key approaches:



Grantmaking: We provide grants to organizations actively championing gender, racial, and economic justice and also award funding directly to women, girls, and gender-expansive people of color to support their leadership development and community initiatives.



Advocacy: We center the lived experiences of women, girls, and gender-expansive people of color, ensuring their perspectives inform policymakers and the local philanthropic sector to promote systemic and institutional changes through a lens of gender, racial, and economic justice.

We extend our deepest gratitude to our sponsors and attendees for making our 25th-anniversary reception an unforgettable success.



OUR PROGRAMS

BLACK WOMEN AND GENDER-EXPANSIVE LEADERSHIP PROJECT

In 2023, we took a bold step forward in our commitment to elevate Black women's leadership in the nonprofit sector by releasing our groundbreaking report, "Thrive as They Lead: Advancing the Infrastructure to Support Black Women Leaders in the D.C. Metro Area Nonprofit Sector." The report arrived at a critical moment, emphasizing the urgent need to center the voices of Black women and gender-expansive leaders in shaping the infrastructure necessary for their leadership to flourish and, in turn, strengthen our communities.



Through the collective wisdom and lived experiences of Black women and gender-expansive leaders, we gained invaluable insights into their successes, challenges, and aspirations. Of 32 Presidents, CEOs, and Executive Directors in the region surveyed, only 19% agreed that D.C. is a place where Black women leaders can thrive. We listened intently to their calls for change, recognizing the systemic inequities and obstacles that hinder their ability to lead authentically and fully.



"Thrive as They Lead" distills the following ten key themes from these conversations, offering a roadmap for funders, philanthropic leaders, and community partners to co-create a sector and region that truly champions and advances the leadership of Black women: Leadership, Support, Expectations, Vulnerability, Resisting Scarcity, Boards, Compensation, Funding, Donor Relationships, and Wellness.

FARLY CARE & FDUCATION FUNDERS COLLABORATIVE

The Early Care and Education Funders Collaborative (ECEFC), now in its 15th year, ensures every child in our region has the strongest start possible. Investing in early childhood education is not simply about building a better system; it's about nurturing the future, one child at a time. Housed at The Women's Foundation, the ECEFC is a powerhouse of collaboration, bringing together funders and changemakers who share a passion for early childhood education. We focus on the big picture, championing systems-change work that tackles racial inequities head-on and takes a holistic approach to child development.

GOALS OF THE INITIATIVE

- Champion Early Childhood Educators: Facilitate the advancement of Early Care and Education issues to enhance support and recognition for early childhood educators, fostering a valued and sustainable Early Care and Education Workforce
- Increase Public Investment: Advance initiatives for increased public funding to support capacity building and pay equity across Early Care and Education systems.
- **Elevate Educators' Voices:** Center the experience and voices of family and center-based early childhood educators in decision-making processes and uplift providers as critical contributors through partnerships that contribute to their well-being, professional development, and business expansion.
- **Data-Driven Decision Making:** Leverage data tracking and research to yield actionable insights for policy enhancements and identify and address gender-based disparities and barriers to equitable early care across the region.



ADVOCATING FOR ACCESS & AFFORDABILITY

- Child Resource Connect and its allies played a critical role in advocating for the passage of HB 495/SB 350, protecting investments in the Child Care Scholarship program. This legislation safeguards access to affordable childcare for countless families in Maryland.
- DC Fiscal Policy Institute (DCFPI), in partnership with Under 3 DC, successfully advocated for an expansion of the childcare subsidy program, now reaching 300% of the federal poverty level. This expansion benefits an additional 2,200 children, primarily Black and brown children, who have been disproportionately affected by childcare affordability challenges.

BUILDING CAPACITY & COMMUNITY

- DC Family Child Care Association (DCFCCA) organized the successful Walk
 for Family Child Care Walkathon on July 29, 2023, raising awareness and
 building community support for family childcare providers. Their advocacy
 efforts also contributed to the passage of the Baby Act, prohibiting
 discrimination against Family Child Care programs in Condo HOAs.
- Maryland State Family Child Care Association (MSSPA) provided critical
 assistance and funding to 30 Spanish-speaking owners of child
 development homes, strengthening their businesses and expanding access
 to quality care. They also supported the opening of three new home-based
 programs.



STAND TOGETHER FUND



Launched in 2020, the Stand Together Fund was our direct response to the COVID-19 crisis, strategically designed to uplift our most vulnerable community members. With the world and our region shutting down, supporting our community became a critical necessity, especially for women, 47% of whom experience intimate partner violence, sexual violence, and/or stalking in their lifetimes.

The pandemic exacerbated this vulnerability, resulting in a 36% increase in calls to survivor support organizations. This surge highlighted the need for increased services for survivors and financial support for frontline care workers facing income loss.

Since its inception, the Stand Together Fund has disbursed grants to 23 regional organizations providing culturally specific services to survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault and those supporting the care economy. By offering general operating funding, we empower these organizations to adapt swiftly and meet the evolving needs of survivors. Additionally, our direct cash assistance payments to childcare workers underscore our trust in the community's ability to make informed decisions and respond innovatively to emerging challenges.

As we conclude this final grant cycle, we express our deepest gratitude to supporters like you who have made this vital work possible. Your generosity has fueled our collective impact, ensuring our community remains resilient despite adversity.

YOUNG WOMEN'S INITIATIVE

The Young Women's Initiative (YWI) continues to be a transformative regional effort dedicated to improving life outcomes and increasing opportunities for young women, girls, and gender-expansive youth of color in the District of Columbia and Prince George's County, Maryland. Through leadership development, advocacy, and direct support to organizations, the Initiative aims to dismantle systemic and institutional barriers to success, enabling young women of color to reach their full potential.

PROGRAMMATIC WORK & EXPANSION

Recently, we expanded the Young Women's Initiative to Prince George's County, MD, broadening our impact and reach.

To achieve our goals and improve educational, economic, and life outcomes for young women, girls, transgender, and gender non-conforming youth of color in the District of Columbia and Prince George's County, Maryland, the Initiative convened, facilitated, and supported the following grantee partners: Community Youth Advance and the DC Girls Coalition.

The Young Women's Initiative was able to:



Select 8 Rock Star Fund recipients, providing them with financial support and mentorship to further their community investment and entrepreneurial goals.



Support the DCGC to provide ongoing support to over 300 young women and gender-expansive youth of color through advocacy and healing circles focused on their safety, health, and well-being.



Support the DCGC to host two town halls, with over 130 attendees, including city leaders, to discuss critical issues impacting young women.



Support the DCGC to convene a youth summit with 40 young people of color, amplifying their voices and perspectives on key

With a one-time award of \$2,000, we're fueling a movement of changemakers who are transforming their communities and providing infrastructure for the next generation of leaders.

Goals of the Initiative


- Mentorship and Community: We go beyond funding by providing personalized support, mentorship, and a vibrant network of like-minded changemakers, fostering collaboration and growth.

As of June 30, 2023




REVENUE
